

**Number 62, December 2002:  
Paid Military Leave for Federal Civilian Employees**

In Law Review 33 (November 2001), I discussed 5 U.S.C. 6323. That is the federal law that gives federal civilian employees 15 days (120 hours) of paid military leave per fiscal year. If you left a federal civilian job for voluntary or involuntary military service, and if you are currently in an "LWOP-U.S." status, you continue to accrue your paid military leave, and you are entitled to use and be paid for that leave during your military service.
